THANK YOU, GINNY

Dedicated Old Zion Board volunteer and retired teacher, Ginny Gillespie will be leaving the Board as of June 1st. She and her husband, Tony, plan to spend more of their free time with their out-of-state children and family members.

Ginny's interest in Old Zion began when she attended an Old Zion sunrise Easter service in the 1960s. She knew former Board members, Dick Boyer and Marie Maugans.

Subsequently, Ginny and her husband, Tony, were married at Old Zion on June 20, 1976.

Their wedding vows were exchanged in front of the Victorian platform altar, as the reproduction wineglass pulpit had not yet been replaced.

After joining the Board, former Board Member, Lynn Rossi, mentored Ginny to assist with weddings and mailings. Eventually, she became the Board Corresponding Secretary and always ended the minutes with a description of the day's weather.

In 2001 Ginny took a leave of absence for health reasons. Upon her return to the Board, she initiated the launching of Old Zion's website and moved the 1813 church into the new age with an email address. Since that time, she has been the "switchboard operator" behind the board's email account, forwarding emails to board members and answering questions about weddings, Christmas Carol Sing tickets, Strawberry Socials, the cemetery, the church's history, and all things Old Zion. Ginny established a working relationship with Ocko Graphics to assist with

maintaining the website. In addition to these tasks, Ginny wrote many press releases, updated the rental agreements, and served on the gravestone Preservation Workshop Committee.

Ginny's tireless efforts ventured into other areas. She was the moving force behind taxexempt status for Old Zion Board as an organization whose legal name is Old Zion German Reformed Church. Currently, she has been the manager and author of the awarded Pennsylvania Keystone Grant with the Pennsylvania Historical Museum Commission. The results and assessments from this grant, which evaluated Old Zion's structural status, will provide guidance to preserve this special place for future generations. Her final words about Old Zion are, "So when the sun sets, we have a grave plot in Old Zion's Cemetery overlooking Brubaker Valley". She will be missed! Well done, Ginny!



ARCHITECTURAL ASSESSMENT OF OLD ZION

On Saturday, April 2nd, historical architect Richard Ortega of Ortega Consulting briefed the Board of Directors on the preliminary results of his assessment of the condition of Old Zion, along with recommendations for restoration and use. The briefing was scheduled in conjunction with the Old Zion Work Day. The assessment is being conducted under a grant from the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission and Old Zion funds. Mr. Ortega began his presentation by complimenting the Board and the friends of Old Zion for keeping the building and grounds in such fine condition.

His primary long-term concern is the buildup of "unresolved lateral stress" in the wooden trusses that support the roof. A diagram of one of the trusses is presented in the picture on the left. To accommodate the concave ceiling of the church sanctuary, the builders of Old Zion Church used several boards to make an arch at the bottom of the truss rather than constructing a straight bottom. As a result, stress has built up within the trusses and is causing the brick north and south walls to begin to bow a small amount. Although it



is difficult to see this bowing, detailed photogrammetry and analysis as part of the project revealed that bowing is occurring and will likely continue unless action is taken sometime over the next several years. You can see the bowing reflected by the yellow color in the diagram of the south wall of Old Zion on the right. Mr. Ortega recommended that Old Zion consider remedying the stress the next time that the roof is replaced.

Mr. Ortega also evaluated the foundations of the church building and found them generally sound. His assessment identified some old foundations beneath the church that may have supported the earlier log church building on the site. When the dirt basement was constructed underneath the current building to accommodate the coal-fired furnace, dirt was scraped away from underneath some of the foundation walls. He recommended that these foundations be shored up at some point in the future.

Mr. Ortega plans to complete his assessment and submit the report to the board by June 2022. At the presentation, Board members expressed appreciation for Mr. Ortega's thorough and expert assessment and recommendations and looked forward to receiving his final report. The Board plans to use this report to help guide the future restoration and use of Old Zion Church.
